## Allison Grace Williams FAIA, NCARB, LEEDAP, NOMA AGWms\_studio

Allison Grace Williams amassed an international portfolio of large scale civic, cultural and research buildings in 40 years of practice as a design leader with SOM, Perkins and Will, and AECOM.



Respected for her inventive instincts and design leadership, her built work bridges culture, technology, and the environment, and is a narrative on the values and traditions of their audience and place. Notably, her work includes: The August Wilson Center (Pittsburgh PA), The Health and Sciences Campus for Princess Abdulrahman University for Women (Saudi Arabia), CREATE (in Singapore), The US Port of Entry at Calexico (Calexico CA) a GSA Design Excellence Commission, and research laboratories at NASA Langley and NASA Ames.

In 2017 Williams founded AGWms studio as a platform for conceptual design consulting, academic engagement and lecturing, design competitions, frequent design juries and pro bono activities. Current clients include Fair Park First Dallas (with Studio\_MLA), University of Illinois, Chicago (New Engineering and Science Building (NESB, a competition won with HDR in 2022, with AGWms studio as conceptual design partner). Williams is an adjunct lecturer in Architecture at Stanford University's new Doerr School of Sustainability, chaired Harvard GSD's Visiting Committee for three cycles and was the 2021 Esherick Distinguished Visiting Professor at UC Berkeley's College of Environmental Design. Williams has juried the COTE Top Ten Design Awards and numerous AIA Chapter and National Design Awards Juries, was appointed and served on the 2021-2023 AIA Jury of Fellows, was appointed in 2023 to the Design Advisory Council to select the architect for the new Global War on Terrorism Memorial to be sited on The Mall in Washington DC. In 2019 Williams delivered the keynote address at NOMA's National Conference in Brooklyn NY.

Williams holds an M.Arch from UC Berkeley's College of Environmental Design, a BA in the Practice of Art, also from Berkeley, was a Loeb Fellow at Harvard GSD and was elevated to AIA Fellowship in the AIA 1997. Williams was awarded The Norma Sklarek Award in Architecture by the AIA California Council in 2018.

Williams lives in San Francisco.

He implements diverse project typologies with challenging entitlements, large integrated teams, and tight fiscal constraints. His integrated project delivery achieves iconic design, technical innovation, restoration and re-purposing of old



fabric that re-invigorates neighborhoods and communities. Committed to smart growth planning and preservation, David is a socially responsible architect charting a sustainable future. He promotes affordable housing as a basic right and cornerstone of smart growth - retaining less affluent residents in old neighborhoods and housing them in new ones. David engages the public through outreach and pro-bono activism, developing alliances and recruiting through leadership at the AIA and the academy, and exposing the results of his work through awards, publication, exhibitions, and presentations. His projects are widely recognized with over 160 national, regional, and local design awards, and in international and national publications including Urban Land, Residential Architect, Inform, Architecture DC and the Washington Post. David has recently organized and chaired two major, highly successful exhibits at the District Architecture Center focusing on architects' impact on the city - reVISION :: THINKING BIG and reBIRTH :: Washington, DC 50 Years after 1968. His outreach extends to boards of related professional, academic, cultural and community organizations where David serves as a Trustee, Director and leader. He mentors and inspires young architects with individual guidance. David is a sought-after design critic, and a frequent lecturer and panelist on current architecture and practice at noted regional universities and public conferences. At the University of Virginia, David completed his architecture degree in 1976, and studied graduate planning. In 2012, he was elevated to the College of Fellows, one of the American Institute of Architects highest individual honors. David received the 2021 Centennial Medal from AIA|DC, the chapter's highest honor, for distinguished service to the Chapter, community, and profession, and the 2022 DCEAS Architect of the Year award.
